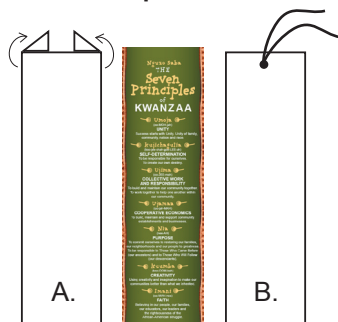

Kwanzaa Bookmark

The book smart way
to be reminded of the
Seven Principles of Kwanzaa!



For best results,
print on heavier paper stock.

MATERIAL:

1. Bookmark printout
2. Scissors or exacto knife
3. Paper glue
4. 3" x 10-1/4" thin cardboard (you can use cardstock or an empty cereal box)
5. Hole punch
6. 6 to 10" red, green and/or black ribbon(s) for tassel

DIRECTIONS:

1. Cut out bookmark as indicated
2. Fold two side flaps along dotted line
3. Glue the 3" x 10-1/4" piece of thin cardboard to the back side center section of the bookmark.
4. Glue side flaps in and secure on the back of the bookmark (See illustration A.)
5. Use a hole punch to punch a hole at the top. Feed red, green and/or black ribbon(s) through hole and knot to make a tassel. (See illustration B.)
